



It also says that we are “wonderfully made” and God’s works are “marvelous.” If we are one of God’s created works – which we are – that means the way we were made is marvelous, too!

Ephesians 1:4-5:

This verse says that God loved us and chose us even before the world was made. And we were chosen to be holy and without fault. This means that God does not see us the way we sometimes see or think about ourselves. Instead, He is reminding us of all the good things He says about us.
